### Sights to See and Things to Do In the Area

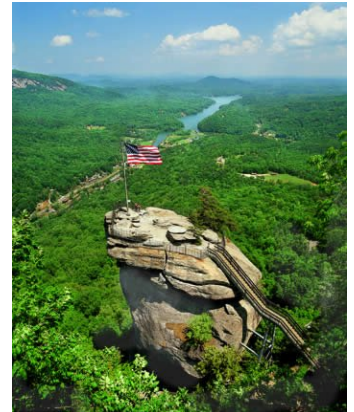
**Biltmore House and Winery**, built by George Vanderbilt, opened in 1895. This magnificent residence covers four acres of floor space and boasts 33 bedrooms, 43 bathrooms, and 65 fireplaces. It is about a 40-minute drive from AVF.



Rumbling Bald offers a Biltmore Tour package with shuttle service. The shuttle will leave from the AVF barn at 8 am and return by 5 pm. Their driver will drop you off at the front door of the estate where you can explore all four levels of the house, including the new rooms that opened just last year. Next you can explore the gardens and conservatory and then finish your day at the Riverbend Farm and Winery. The tour cost of \$70 includes transportation by van to and from AVF and a two-day Biltmore Estate ticket, which allows you to return the following day at no expense. The tour package is available on Tuesday and Thursday, April 13 and 15. The shuttle is limited to 12 persons each day. **Advanced reservations are required.** Please contact Celeste Padgett at Rumbling Bald to make your reservation. Her phone number is 828-694-3050.

If you plan to go on your own, here is some more information. Biltmore House tickets can be purchased at [www.biltmore.com](http://www.biltmore.com) or by calling 800 742-6150. From Interstate 40, the estate is located just north of exit 50 or 50B on US highway 25. Biltmore House is opened daily 9:00 to 5:00. Tickets cost \$60 per day. If one day isn't enough to see and do everything at Biltmore, then you can extend your visit by purchasing a next day upgrade for \$10.00 at one of the Guest Services locations on the day of your visit. (35 miles from AVF – allow 1 hr & 5 mins)

**Bald Mountain and Apple Valley Golf Courses** – Both are located within a mile of AVF. Bald Mountain was originally built in 1968. Its name came from the rock-faced cliffs towering over the course. However, it will be the less prominent features that command your attention to score well here. With well guarded greens and tight fairways, golfers must be precise with their drives and approach shots. The course rating is 70.9 and the slope rating is 128. The Apple Valley course is a Dan Maples creation and is called one of the most beautiful mountain courses around by Golf Digest's "places to play." Apple Valley's length provides opportunities for spectacular drives. It's after the drive where golfers need to think clearly to score well. Well positioned bunkers and undulating terrain present a variety of tough shots to golfers of all abilities. The course rating is 73.2 and the slope rating is 140. **Chimney Rock State Park** – 800 277-9611 – [www.chimneyrockpark.com](http://www.chimneyrockpark.com) - Take U.S. Highway 64/74A to the Chimney Rock entrance. If you love nature then Chimney Rock can be the natural fulfillment of your trip to the North Carolina Mountains. Take a deep breath of refreshing mountain air, become invigorated by the hiking trails, and let your cares fade away in the cool mist of Hickory Nut Falls. This is the perfect place to reconnect with nature and spend time with friends. There is easy access by a 26-story elevator inside the mountain. Chimney Rock offers the best of the mountains in one place – spectacular 75-mile views, hiking trails for all abilities, and a 404-foot waterfall. Allow 1.5 to 5 hours. Open at 8:30am to 5:30pm daily. Cost is \$14. (11 miles from AVF – allow 25 minutes to drive)

**Carl Sandburg Home National Historic Site** – 828 693-4178 – [www.nps.gov/carl](http://www.nps.gov/carl) - 1928 Little River, Flat Rock, NC -

Carl Sandburg, American poet, historian, author, and lecturer spent the final 22 years of his life at this estate. The home was built in 1838 and houses Sandburg's collection of 10,000 books, notes and papers. The National Park Service operates the facility and it is opened daily except Christmas. Admission: Free for grounds, trails and barn; *no park entrance fee*. Guided house tour fee (cash or check only) is \$3.00 for seniors 62 and older. The house tours are offered daily and run 30-minutes. The first tour begins at 9:30am and the last tour begins at 4:30pm. (32 miles from AVF – allow 1 hr & 5 minutes to drive) The Sandburg Home and the Flat Rock Playhouse are less than a mile apart.



**Flat Rock Playhouse** – 828 693-0731 – [www.flatrockplayhouse.org](http://www.flatrockplayhouse.org) - 2661 Greenville Highway, Flat Rock, NC. This state theater of NC is considered one of the 10 best theaters in the country. March 31 – April 25: CLINT HOLMES - Musical review starring acclaimed Las Vegas showman, Clint Holmes. Holmes is an award-winning and multi talented entertainer who puts on an amazing performance. Using his knowledge and love of music, he brings the stage to life and the audience to their feet. Cost is \$36 for seniors. Call for schedule and reservations. (31 miles from AVF – allow 1 hr & 5 mins)



**Blue Ridge Parkway** – 828 298-0398 or 800 228-7275 - <http://www.blueridgeparkway.org>  
The Parkway's 469 toll free miles combine awesome natural beauty, mountain forests, wildlife, wildflowers, and magnificent views. Designed especially for leisure travel and enjoyment, there are numerous overlooks and parking areas to view some of America's finest scenic vistas. The Folk Art Center (828 298-7928 – [www.southernhighlandguild.org](http://www.southernhighlandguild.org)) is located at milepost 382 on the Blue Ridge Parkway just north of the Hwy 70 entrance in east Asheville. The center contains a changing gallery of traditional and contemporary craft exhibits of guild members from a nine-state, southeast region. The permanent collection dates back to the early 20<sup>th</sup> century. They have exhibitions, demonstrations, lectures and performances. Call for times and calendar of events. Free. (29 miles from AVF – allow 51 mins)



## OTHER POINTS OF INTEREST IN THE AREA

**Art Museum** – 828 253-3227 – Located in the Old Pack Library at 2 South Pack Square. There are permanent collections of 20<sup>th</sup> century American art, including works by George Innes, Jacob Lawrence, Romaine Bearden, Kenneth Noland and Louis Nevelson. Admission is \$5 for seniors. Hours: Tues - Sat 10 am - 5 pm, Sun 1 - 5 pm. (34 miles from AVF – allow 1 hr)



**Botanical Gardens** – 828 252-5190 – 151 W Weaver Blvd – 10-acre site located adjacent to campus of University of NC at Asheville. The gardens have over 600 varieties of plants native to the Southern Appalachian region. The Cole Library of the Botanical Gardens contains more than 1000 books relating to botany, horticulture, ecology, and ornithology. The grounds are open year round from sunrise to sunset and no admission is charged for entrance. (35 miles from AVF – allow 1 hr)

**NC Arboretum** – 828 665-2492 – [www.ncarboretum.org](http://www.ncarboretum.org) - 100 Frederick Law Olmsted Way –



The 434 acre arboretum is located in one of the most botanically diverse and beautiful natural settings in America. Stroll through acres of gardens or visit their hiking and mountain bike trails. If you do not want to walk and are adventuresome, take the "Guide through Nature" program on Segways. The tour participants will be standing/balancing on the Segway machine platform for up to three hours, with numerous opportunities to step off the machine and check out points of interest. Tours are \$55 per person and begin at 10 a.m. and 2 p.m.,



Monday through Saturday, and 1 p.m. on Sunday. Visitors enjoy exploring the Arboretum's outdoor exhibits such as art installations and 65 acres of cultivated gardens, including one of the finest, most unique bonsai collections in the United States. The visitors' center, gallery exhibits and educational programs are opened April to October: 8am to 9pm and November to March: 8am to 7pm. Parking is \$8 per personal motor vehicle. (41 miles from AVF – allow 1 hr & 10 mins)

**Thomas Wolfe Memorial** – 828 253-8304 – [www.wolfememorial.com](http://www.wolfememorial.com) - 52 N Market St – Considered by many to be one of the giants of 20<sup>th</sup> Century American Literature, Thomas Wolfe immortalized his childhood home in his epic autobiographical novel, Look Homeward, Angel. Wolfe's colorful portrayal of his family, his hometown of Asheville, North Carolina, and the Old Kentucky Home boarding house earned the historic Victorian home a place as one of American Literature's most famous landmarks. Visitors' center and guided tours on site. Hours: 9:00am - 5:00pm Tuesday - Saturday, 1:00pm - 5:00pm, Sunday, closed Mondays. Admission - \$1. (34 miles from AVF – allow 1 hr)



**Urban Trail** – 828 259-5855 – This trail is a museum without walls, illustrating the city's heritage in story and art along a 1.7 mile walking tour of downtown Asheville. It takes about 2 hours to walk the trail. Rent an audiocassette for \$5 from the museum shop at the Asheville Art Museum in Pack Place. Guided tours from the Arts Council are available for \$5 at 3:00pm on Saturdays. Call 828 258-0710 for reservations. (34 miles from AVF – allow 1 hr)

**WNC Farmers Market** – 828-253-1691 - 570 Brevard Road - Thirty-six-acre site with a beautiful panoramic view of the mountains, and the Biltmore Estate. The market was first opened in 1977, and is now open all year round, and seven days a week. This state owned facility houses approximately 70 vendors that offer farm fresh produce, canned goods, honey and handcrafted items. Hours are Apr – Oct 8am - 6pm and Nov – Mar 8am – 5pm. Admission is FREE. (36 miles from AVF – allow 1 hr)

**Blowing Rock** - Highway 321 S at Blowing Rock, NC - Blowing Rock is an immense cliff 4000 ft above sea level, overhanging Johns River Gorge 3000 ft below. At this attraction one can observe the rocky walls of the gorge, which form a flume through which the northwest wind sweeps with such force, that it returns light objects cast over the edge. Ripley's "*Believe it or not*" states: "The Blowing Rock is the only place in the world where it snows upside down." It is NC's oldest travel attraction, in operation since 1933. Open all year weather permitting. The hours are 9-5 except during the summer when it is open until 7. Admission: \$5 for seniors. (76 miles from AVF – allow 2 hr)

**Grandfather Mountain** – 800 468-7325 – [www.grandfather.com](http://www.grandfather.com) - US 221 and Blue Ridge Parkway, Linville, NC 28646 - Cross the highest swinging footbridge in America (the 228-foot suspension bridge spans an 80-foot chasm at more than one mile in elevation), check out the wildlife, hike, picnic, and explore the nature museum at Grandfather Mountain. The park recommends that you plan on arriving before 11:00am. Plan to stay three (3) hours - longer if hiking on top. Open daily except Thanksgiving and Christmas. Hours: winter - 8am to 5pm, fall and spring – 8am to 6pm, and summer 8am to 7pm. Cost for seniors is \$13. (66 miles from AVF – allow 1 hr & 50 mins)



**Linville Caverns** – 800 419-0540 – 19929 US 221 N Marion, NC 28752 - [www.linvillecaverns.com](http://www.linvillecaverns.com) - US 221 between Linville and Marion, 4 miles south of the Blue Ridge Parkway. Linville Caverns lie deep under Humpback Mountain. Experienced guides accompany visitors through the caverns. Electric lights reveal the underground wonders in stone as the level, smooth path takes them into the innermost recesses of the caverns. 9am to 6pm – June 1 thru Labor Day, 9am to 5pm April, May, Sept, & Oct, 9am to 4:30pm – Nov thru March, Weekends only – Dec, Jan & Feb – Admission \$5.50 for seniors. (40 miles from AVF – allow 1 hr & 10 mins)

**Mount Mitchell** – 828 675-4611 - 2388 State Highway 128, Burnsville, NC - NE of Asheville off Blue Ridge Parkway on NC 128 - This is the highest peak of the Appalachian Mountains and the highest point east of the Mississippi (soaring up 6,684 feet) offering a viewpoint of breathtaking Blue Ridge scenery. Museum, restaurant, hiking trails, observation tower, picnic area, and visitors' center. Park hours are Nov – Feb 8am – 6pm, Mar, Apr, Sept, & Oct 8am – 8pm and May – Aug 8am – 9pm. FREE admission. (48 miles from AVF – allow 1 hr & 30 mins)

**Great Smokey Mountain Railroad** – 800 872-4681 – [www.gsmr.com](http://www.gsmr.com) - 224 Everett Street, Bryson City, NC - With 53 miles of track, 2 tunnels and 25 bridges, the Great Smoky Mountains Railroad offers a variety of excursions that explore the amazing landscape of Western North Carolina. Trains depart from the historic mountain town of Bryson City. This 4.5 hour, 44 mile round-trip will take passengers along the Little



Tennessee River, over the impressive Fontana Lake Trestle and into the Nantahala River Gorge. There is a 1 hour layover at the Nantahala Outdoor Center. April 1 – May 8 the train runs Tuesday through Saturday departing at 10:30am and the cost is approximately \$49. Call or check out the website for schedule. (47 miles from AVF – allow 1 hr & 30 mins)

**Cedar Creek Stables** – 828 625-2811 – [www.cedarcreekstables.com](http://www.cedarcreekstables.com) - 542 Cedar Creek Road off Bills Creek Road, Lake Lure. Horseback riding, authentic gem mine, and stocked fishing lake on site. Open daily 9am to 6pm all year.

**Lake Lure Tours, Marina, and Beach** – 877 FUN-4ALL – [www.lakelure.com](http://www.lakelure.com) - Hourly tours, dinner cruises, private charters; paddleboat, canoe, electric & pontoon boat rentals; entertainment and special events; concessions and beach.

**Depot and Model Railroad** – 828 693-0605 - Maple St off 7<sup>th</sup> Ave Hendersonville, NC 28792 – Restored train depot housing Apple Valley Model Railroad Club's HO Scale model railroad depicting Hendersonville, Brevard and Saluda. Old Southern RR caboose parked outside. Contact Harry Bothwell for more information.

**Flat Rock Playhouse** – see description above

**Foothills Equestrian Nature Center** – 828 859-9021 – [www.fence.org](http://www.fence.org) - 3381 Hunting Country Rd, Tryon, NC. A 320-acre nature education and recreation center, offering 5 miles of hiking and riding trails, an equestrian center with stabling of 200 horses and a variety of family-oriented nature education programs, outdoor concerts and more. Free.

**Foothills Highland Games** – 828 859-2050 – [www.scotsfoothillshg.org](http://www.scotsfoothillshg.org) – The games are held in the fall at Jackson Park in Hendersonville, NC. The calling of the clans is Friday night and the games are held on Saturday. The events typically are held in early November.

**The Mineral and Lapidary Museum** – 828 698-1977 – 400 N Main St – In November 1997 this museum opened to the public. Run by members of the Henderson County Gem and Mineral Society, the museum has a nice array of minerals, rocks, and fossils. Hours are Mon – Fri 1-5pm and Sat 10am -5pm. Donations are welcomed.



**Western NC Air Museum** – 828 298-5600 – [www.wncairmuseum.com](http://www.wncairmuseum.com) - 1340 Gilbert St – This is the first “air museum” in NC. It includes restored antique aircraft, as well as vintage antique replicas. Bring your camera, and your leather jacket. You can view the airplanes in an hour or so, or spend the afternoon hanger-flying with the friendly, informative staff. They don't guarantee fine weather, but the hanger doors are open rain or shine. And they can't guarantee that they will be flying on the day you visit, but they do promise to propel your imagination back to the golden age of general aviation. Come for the airplanes. Stay for the memories. There are plenty of both at the Western North Carolina Air Museum. It is located at Hendersonville Airport. Free.

## SHOPPING OPPORTUNITITES

**Hendersonville** – is a boutique style shopping area containing arts and craft shops and antique stores along a tree-lined main street enhanced with restored historic buildings, planters brimming with seasonal flowers, and plenty of comfortable benches on the wide sidewalks. The Blue Ridge Mall, on Four Seasons Blvd, features Belk, JC Penney, Tuesday Morning and K-Mart. Direct from the factory pricing can be found at Bon Worth at Hwy 64 East. Wal-Mart and Sam's Club are on Hwy 64 East just before Interstate 26.

**Asheville** – Biltmore Square Mall, off I-26 at Exit 5, has a Belk, Dillard's, and over 40 specialty shops. The Asheville Mall on Tunnel Road is western NC's largest shopping center and features Belk, Dillard's, Penney's, Sears, a large food court and over 120 other inviting shops. Across from the entrance to Biltmore Estates is Biltmore Village. This quaint area encompasses 12 blocks of historic homes that have been converted into unusual shops, restaurants, and galleries. And for the person with an unusual size foot, check out Tops, downtown at 27 N Lexington St. They carry all sizes and widths. Guild Crafts showcases the work of members of the Southern Highland Craft Guild. They are considered one of the most unique gem mine, fossil dig & gift shop in the south. Open daily 10am- 6pm.

Their complete menu is prepared in house from scratch, even the salad dressings. From the extensive wine selection to their diverse creations in the kitchen, there is something for everyone. The Outfitters provide clothing, footwear, and accessories for all your mountain adventures. Bubbas is open every day from 10am until 5pm and on Saturday we stay open until 6pm.

**Chimney Rock Gemstone Mine** – 297 Main Street, Chimney Rock – (828) 625-5524 - At this mine you can experience the wonder and excitement of prospecting for gemstones in a pleasant and comfortable atmosphere. Rocks and minerals of all kinds have been found including Aquamarine, Emerald, Ruby, Garnet, Peridot, Quartz, Agate, Hematite, Amethyst, Sodalite, and many more. The gemstone mine guaranties a gem find every time. Gemstone buckets are available in numerous varieties and prices. Many valuable gemstones are found each day and you keep what you find! All equipment is furnished and there is no experience necessary. You might want to have some of your stones cut and mounted into rings, earrings, and pendants. Turn around time for your custom made piece is usually about one week.

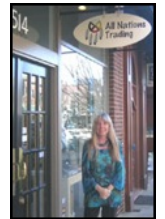
**Old Rock Café** - 431 Main Street, Chimney Rock - 828-625-2329 - You know those great little places you find on the best road trips? The Old Rock Café is one of them. It's located right next to the entrance of Chimney Rock Park alongside the Rocky Broad River in Chimney Rock Village. There you can enjoy tasty sandwiches, crispy salads and yummy desserts, either indoors or on their scenic riverside deck. Or, order a Hiker's Lunch to take out on the trails. I recommend the pecan salad pita with sweet potato fries! It's nothing fancy, just a fun place to relax, have a great meal, and sip a soda, glass of wine or a cold beer as you savor the incredible views. They take turns working in the store and are more than happy to help you in choosing just the perfect item for your desires and needs. Many of the artists demonstrate their talents while you shop.
